The changing climate in Northeast BC



What's the difference between weather and climate?

Weather ~ outcome of an individual game

Climate ~ average score over several seasons



Hotter summers

Number of days above 25°C and above 30°C has been steadily increasing

	past	present	In three
	(1971-2000)	(2020s)	decades
>25°C	16	26	40
	days/year	days/year	days/year
>30°C	1	3	10
	days/year	days/year	days/year





What to expect?

- Hotter and drier summers
- More extreme heat events
- Higher cooling demands
- Greater potential for droughts in late summer
- Higher risk of wildfires

Warmer winters

- Less frost and ice days
- Greater potential for beetle infestation
- More frequent rain-on-snow events
- Less snowpack
- Earlier and more rapid snowmelt
- Increase in floods and droughts





Increased precipitation

- Increase in total precipitation, particularly in spring and fall
- Increase in intensity and frequency of precipitation
- This can lead to more frequent:
 - sewer back-up
 - flooding

Earlier and more rapid freshet




More intense and frequent precipitation

more frequent and intense FLOODS



Future floods will be more intense and frequent than those that Dawson Creek has experienced so far

Impacts of floods

- Damage to buildings
- Mental health effects
- Increased stress on private layouts and sanitary sewer
- Street flooding and road closures
- Sewage backups
- Power outages

Main takeaways

- Dawson Creek has already experienced the impacts of changing climate
- In the near future, the region is expected to experience hotter summers, warmer winters, and increased precipitation
- Extreme weather events (including floods)
 will increase in frequency and intensity
- Future can no longer be judged by past experience







Creek Flooding




Pluvial Flooding



102 Avenue Water Elevation and Precipitation








Post 2016 Flood Mitigation Work





Know your Insurance:




If you are a renter, ask your landlord if your home has flood insurance. If not, suggest they get it!




If you are a homeowner, remember that standard homeowner insurance often does <u>not</u> cover flood damage.

Can you locate yourself?




Being able to locate your house on a flood map is important, since it allows you to understand whether you live in an area with high risk of flooding


Open Mentimeter, you will see a map: find your neighborhood and place the pin where your house is located!

An Emergency Plan allows you to know what steps to take during flooding. Find it on "PreparedBC" website.





How well do you know your neighbors? During an emergency, support is important. Build relationships now!




Elders and other vulnerable individuals. Do you know members of the community that might not be prepared for flooding? Help them prepare!

Imminent Flooding

- Stay updated through <u>City website</u>
- Notify loved ones, friends, neighbours
- Follow recommended driving routes
- Limit toilet flushing and washing

Evacuation Stages

Evacuation Alert

Prepare to leave

- Gather emergency bags and plans
- Shut off electricity to flood-risk areas
- Move household items and vehicles to flood-safe areas

Evacuation Order

Leave immediately

- Follow all directions from officials
- Do not cross rivers, streams, flooded roads

Evacuation Rescind

Return home

follow "After the Flood" steps


